
YOU'RE INVITED TO VVEC'S 87TH ANNUAL MEETING!

- First, check your fuses or circuit breakers. Every service is different. You may have fuses or circuit breakers in your house, on the side of your house, under your meter, or all three places. Check to see if your neighbors have electricity.
- •Then, call the co-op at 371-2584 or 1-800-870-5948. Have your account number, name as it appears on the account, and address handy to give to the dispatcher. If you should get a recording, leave your information; every message will be answered.
- •Download the SmartHub app at www. smarthubapp.com to report outages from your smartphone.



Nowata Nursing Center, where we delivered flowers and VVEC hats to the residents—and walked away with far more than we gave.



Cooperatives like Verdigris Valley Electric are unique in that they are a not-for profit business. What this means to our member owners is that they have a stake in the finances of Cooperative. The Cooperative answers to the members not unrelated stockholders. To this end, the Cooperative distributes its revenue in excess of expenses back to the members through margins or capital credits.


This year after carefully reviewing the financial matters of the Cooperative, your board of trustees approved the return of \$747,891.00 in capital credit or patronage refunds. This is the 32nd consecutive year capital credits have been returned to the members. A total of \$21,540,173 has been returned to the members since the Cooperative started business in 1938.

Capital Credits and Patronage refunds will be returned to members and former members that received power from the Cooperative in 1985.

For all active members a credit will appear as a "patronage refund" on their October 2025 bills. Members that have multiple accounts will receive one credit on the membership account; that one credit will reflect the total accumulated capital refunds from all of their accounts.

Former members that had service in 1985 will receive a check if the refund is greater than \$5.00; lesser amounts will be held in the account awaiting the time that accumulated capital credits reach the \$5.00 threshold.

STAYING SAFE ON CAMPUS

DORM & COLLEGE SAFETY TIPS

Whether it's your first semester away from home or you're returning for another year of college life, campus safety is always worth a refresher. Living in a dorm or apartment brings new freedoms—and new responsibilities. From protecting personal belongings to preventing electrical hazards, a little preparation goes a long way.

PERSONAL SAFETY & SECURITY

- •Lock your doors—even when you're home. Dorms can see a lot of foot traffic.
- •Get to know your neighbors and stay aware of your surroundings.
- •Keep valuables out of sight and avoid leaving electronics near open windows.
- •Walk in groups at night and stick to well-lit paths.
- •Save campus security's number in your phone, just in case.

ELECTRICAL SAFETY IN DORMS



College life often means plugging in laptops, mini-fridges, lamps, and more—but overloading your space can create serious risks.

Here's how to stay safe:

- •Never overload outlets or power strips. Too many high-energy devices in one place can cause overheating.
- •Use surge protectors, not extension cords, for computers and electronics.
- •Don't run cords under rugs or furniture. It's a fire hazard and wears down the cord.
- •Keep flammable items away from heat sources. That includes space heaters, coffee makers, and curling irons.
- •Unplug small appliances when not in use—this helps prevent both fire risks and energy waste.
- •Inspect cords regularly. If a cord is frayed, cracked, or damaged, stop using it immediately.

KEEP BELONGINGS SECURE

- Avoid clutter near heat sources
- Back up your digital files
- Have a first aid kit & extinguisher



THINK SAFE, STUDY SAFE

Many dorms have specific rules about what appliances or extension cords are allowed. Check with housing staff before move-in day to make sure you're in compliance and avoid any surprises.
